In the fall of 2016, I began a 14 month sabbatical to study in more detail the history, culture and the arts of Pueblo, Colorado. I felt that if I were to invest in Pueblo for the long term, I needed to understand in greater depth and ease the layers of Pueblo's unique community fabric. When studying many of the issues confronting the community today, I was most struck by the 1.7% housing vacancy rate in Pueblo, which means that whether you are homeless or even wealthy, there is not enough housing inventory to sustain stable and thoughtful economic growth. This was the start of **Pueblo Sustainable Solutions L3C** and the partnership with my brother Jeff, who has for the past 15 years been actively engaged in sustainable housing development in Costa Rica.

After conversations with many of Pueblo's front line thought leaders. it became evident that after housing then came energy, waste and industrial hemp. These four pillars form the foundation and priorities of **Pueblo Sustainable Solutions L3C** and serve as the directive in our educational and development efforts. **SUSTAIN** magazine is our way of sharing the stories of sustainability along the Arkansas River.


A trailblazing journey to the shores of Pueblo

Creativity



L3C WHAT?

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE BRIDGING THE PRIVATE AND PUBLIC BENEFIT SPHERES OF ACCOUNTABILITY IN ACTION

An L3C is new variation of the limited liability company (LLC). It is also known as a low-profit, limited liability company. What sets it apart from regular LLCs and other for-profit entities (i.e. corporations, partnership, etc.) is its ability to pursue charitable, educational or socially beneficial objectives as its primary motive. Although the L3C can also pursue profit-oriented objectives, they are secondary to its social goals. The L3C is a hybrid entity taking on the flexible characteristics of an LLC in combination with a low-profit socially beneficial objective.

How did two brothers from California end up in Pueblo after decades of divergent pathways living in Costa Rica and Japan?

The Howell Brothers grew up in Southern California at the foot of the Santa Monica Mountains which traverse up and down the Pacific Ocean coastline just west of Los Angeles. Every free moment not spent at home, school or church, was enjoyed exploring the hillsides and valleys surrounding their community from Hwy 101 to the Pacific Ocean. Activities were endless from building tree forts to mountain biking to exploring old movie sets which dotted the landscape. Over the years the Brothers developed a strong connection to nature and the awesome responsibilities that come with respecting and preserving the environment for future generations.

Each year the Howell Family embarked on an annual vacation to a faraway destination which offered additional opportunities for Jeff and Gregory to explore and interact with people of other countries and to experience the various ways in which locals engage with nature and the surrounding environment. Over time, each brother developed a distinct vision of the world, with Jeff honoring the ocean as his sanctuary and pursuing a career in thoughtful design and construction in Costa Rica, and Gregory following his childhood passion for Japan working in both the private and public sectors as a liaison and international coordinator for urban planning and design. Having learned the value of hard work and perseverance from the examples set forth by their parents, grandparents and great grandparents, it is no surprise that both brothers ventured overseas on their own terms to
